The Year 6's greatly enjoyed invigilating the ten minute tests to the highest standard—there was a lot of patrolling

round the hall to check parents were not cheating, talking or using their phones! They particularly enjoyed marking their parents' tests—I can't think why!

Our parents were great sports and really entered into the spirit of the test. There was a lot of grumbling at the grammar questions, and desperation at trying to remember long-lost maths concepts!

This event was part of a campaign run by a group called More than a Score. Schools from all over the country took part, as well as a cross-party group of MPs at Westminster. Many educationalists,


headteachers and parents feel very strongly that there is far too much statutory assessment in primary schools and that, in particular, the end of Year 6 SATs do not actually help children to improve or provide useful information to secondary schools.



I was lucky enough to be invited to Whitehall to attend a presentation of a report by ICAPE (the Independent Commission on Assessment in Primary Education) on Assessment for Children's Learning: A New Future for Primary Education in November. Amongst their recommendations,

they concluded that high stakes assessment for primary-age children should be

phased out and replaced by more emphasis on assessment for learning and a holistic assessment of each pu-





We will wait and see if any of these recommendations are acted upon by the government in the year to come.



Despite the recent bad weather, we are so pleased that we still have a huge number of children traveling to school in an active way as part of the WOW Walk to School Challenge! In fact, the percentage of active journeys has increased from 87% in September to 90% in

October to 92% in November! Just over a third of pupils walk to school, with the percentage of children cycling being around 2%. As the weather improves next term, we hope to have a 'Bling' Your Bike Day to encourage more children to cycle to school.


