Choosing Day

Yes, that time is nearly upon us....the first School Council Choosing Day on Friday, 10th June... all part of our Library Appeal.

On this day, the School Council are asking every pupil in the school to bring in £1 to wear whatever they choose and then an additional £1 to spend on a class activity (each class has come up with their own money-raising idea).

The School Council have held a school-wide vote to choose the school dinner on that day (hot dog and chips, followed by a doughnut and accompanied by a milkshake) and teachers have been told that children need to choose **at least** two lessons on this day!

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Walk to School Week!

For each day starting from Monday 20th June, we would like the children to take part in Walk To School Week! Each morning, the children should aim to complete walked journeys (including wheeling, cycling, scooting and park and stride*). For each journey, the children will collect daily reward stickers as well as help to complete the class wallchart. In addition, the children will receive a pupil activity diary and also a bookmark upon completion of the challenge.

The theme for the week is **Power Up!** With five video game-inspired missions to complete, each class will need to **Team Up**; **Defeat Danger**; **Bost Health**; **Save the Planet**; and **Lead the Way**.

*Park and stride for our school includes parking at the village hall (or a distance further away) and walking from there to school.

Essex Wildlife Trust

Year 1 have loved taking part in their Forest School Sessions this term. There have been a lot of muddy boots and excited children on a Thursday morning, and teachers have reported that the sessions have really helped to develop children's independence and observational skills.

Educational Visits

Y4 are finishing this half term with a trip to the castle whilst Y1 visited Silver Witch Green this week and Y6 are currently on their residential trip. Next half term, there are several other visits taking place including: History visits to the school for Y1, Y3 and Y5; Y2 taking part in a drumming workshop, Y5 and Reception having a Road Safety session, and lots more...

Library Cards

Following information about the new Essex Library cards within the Bulletin published on Monday 9th May, we have now received the cards and will send them home with your child this week (Year 6 will receive theirs after half term). We hope you are able to use them over the half term break and, of course, during the summer holidays for the Summer Reading Challenge.

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ATTENDANCE

As we go forward into the new half-term, we would like to clarify some of our school expectations regarding holidays during term-time and daily attendance, as there have been a spate of holiday requests during the last few weeks. As a rule, **Requests for Family holidays will not be authorised during term-time.** If you are taking your children out of school for this purpose, the time off will be marked as unauthorised, and you could receive a Penalty Notice.

Unauthorised absence includes:

- parents keeping children off school unnecessarily e.g. because they had a late night or for non-infectious illness or injury that would not affect their ability to learn.
- absences which have never been properly explained
- children who arrive at school after the close of registration are marked using a 'U'. This indicates that they are in school for safeguarding purposes however it is recorded as an absence for the session.
- shopping trips
- looking after other children or children accompanying siblings or parents to medical appointments
- their own or family birthdays
- holidays taken during term time without leave not deemed 'for exceptional purposes' by the headteacher- may result in school applying to the local authority to issue a penalty notice or if you have previously been issued a Penalty Notice, the school may request a direct prosecution by the local authority.
- day trips
- other leave of absence in term time which has not been agreed

 Stanway Primary School Attendance Policy

There are only 190 statutory school days in one year and 175 days (weekends and school holidays) available to use for holidays. Therefore every school day counts!

Daily Attendance

Up until fairly recently, we have urged parents to keep their children away from school if they are even slightly ill, and we thank you for your support with this. Moving forwards, we would ask parents to use their discretion in deciding if their child is fit to attend school or not. Children who have mild cold-like symptoms, but feel well enough to be in school, can still attend school, and we would ask that parents support us in encouraging children to attend school as regularly as possible. Even only two or three days missed every half-term equates to 18 weeks of missed learning throughout the primary phase— almost half a year of schooling...

Whilst any child may occasionally have time off school because they are ill, sometimes they can be reluctant to attend school. Any problems with regular attendance are best sorted out between the school, the parents and the child. If a parent thinks their child is reluctant to attend school then we will work with that family to understand the root problem and provide any necessary support. We can use outside agencies to help with this such as the School Nurse, The Local Authority or a Child and Family Support Worker.

Late Arrivals

Although children are not officially late until after 8.50am when the gates are locked, it is helpful if children are in school as early as possible so that they can be fully part of the morning routine, taking part in the registration activity and preparing themselves for learning. It is disturbing for both the child and the class if they get into a pattern of always entering slightly later than everyone else. Parents are asked to contact school before 9.00am to notify us of a child's absence. Authorised absence, e.g. illness or medical appointments, must be supported by a phone call, email or letter from parents explaining the reason for the absence. Where parents fail to make contact providing a reason for absence, the School Office will go through all your child's named contacts and refer to our safeguarding policy if necessary.

Get involved in the Essex Year of Reading

To mark the Essex Year of Reading 2022, Essex County Council has been working on a range of initiatives to inspire every child in Essex to become a confident reader and develop a lifelong love of reading. We are also working to address the impact that Covid-19 has had on children and young people's education by providing events, activities, and opportunities to help improve their reading levels.

As part of this project, we are providing children with their very own library card and bookmark which they will receive via their school. Each library card has its own unique barcode, so all you need to do is bring this card along to any Essex Library to register it in your child's name. You can then get started right away. Children can use their library card to choose books, join in with out-of-school activities, access homework help, use free computers and lots more.

Once they have signed up for the library, children will be able to take part in this years' Summer Reading Challenge. This is a national initiative that encourages children to read books throughout the summer holidays, collecting a medal, stickers and a certificate along the way.
